Since we last reached out, our staff/board collective has experienced significant changes. Among us are those who have experienced losses even as we have been blessed with new children in our families as well. The circle of life continues even as the sudden changes caused by the spread of COVID-19 make it clear that the rhythms of daily life tend to repel us from each other rather than bring us together in economic bonds of Solidarity and Mutual Aid.

Since we last reached out, we have also experienced challenges within Worcester Roots and our home in the Stone Soup Collective and Community Resource Center. We are working through those challenges and look forward to growing stronger, healthier, and wiser as we move through them. The Mutual Aid network that launched in Worcester as a rapid response to this crisis (see below) uplifts values such as mutuality and authentic connection and principles such as challenging oppressive dynamics in the service of connection and trust. These are values that Worcester Roots has historically embraced as we work towards a more cooperative economy and shared ownership. We take seriously the challenges we have faced living up to our own values. Thank you for trusting Worcester Roots with overwhelming support over the years that empowers us to meet this moment with resilience and clarity in our mission.

Some things, however, have not changed. We continue to embrace the local effort to build an economy based on values of solidarity and equity in all dimensions. We recognize the way that worker-owned cooperatives, mutual aid networks, trade unions, workers' and neighborhood councils, popular assemblies, credit unions, alternative currency/banking systems, community land trusts, and other people-powered formations stand out in full relief in this moment of crisis and signal that another has arrived.

The habits and rhythms of cooperation, collective care, and commitment to democratic principles (not just its formalities), makes the resilience of communities in the midst of socio-economic crises. "Mutual Aid" in Worcester and Beyond

Mutual Aid Worcester emerged on facebook on Friday, March 13th as an open platform for Worcester residents to express immediate needs and deliver timely support to address the social impact of COVID-19. At this time, the Facebook page has almost 4,000 members; the network has "officially" accumulated over 260 volunteers through Google intake forms and enabled who knows how many more connections via direct communication on the facebook page itself.



Community members organized at least 12 autonomous working groups to address needs spanning from transportation, volunteer coordination, fundraising, education, language and accessibility, needs assessment, etc. Folks, being accountable to their own capacity, flow in and out of the emergent ecosystem of working groups in order to meet needs produced by broken socioeconomic systems, which are now exacerbated by COVID-19. We are pleased, but not surprised to see members of our organization including Youth Co-op members (see section below) enthusiastically support this compassionate, powerful response to the crisis.

A Global Rapid Response with Deep Roots

Mutual Aid Worcester (MAW) is but one of many, many mutual aid networks around the world that have emerged and/or ramped up their efforts to respond to COVID-19. The term Mutual Aid itself entered critical social discourse toward the end of the 19th century from Peter Kropotkin's ecological observations and analysis in Siberia and Northeast Asia, and led him to the conclusion that mutually-beneficial cooperation within and between animal groups is a "factor in evolution." This factor, Kropotkin argued, was harmfully down-played by theories which individualized human beings within a tendency known as Social Darwinism. We are in this together, and being in this together means practicing mutual aid not just as a temporary response to crisis but as a

"I think the most important lesson to learn from Mutual Aid Worcester is dissolving the false separation between "volunteers" and "the needy."
